### **An Ounce of Prevention**

In the past month, I have heard of several cases where repair people, and other workers have come into a home to be confronted by unfriendly dogs, or dogs that jump all over them. Many dogs think that everyone that comes to the house comes to visit them, and they proceed to show this gratitude by wildly bouncing off visitors. Other dogs feel that the intruders are a danger to the family and express this attitude in no uncertain terms. In either case, I believe it to be very unfair and rude for workers and guests to come into your house, to visit or provide a service, and be accosted by wild dogs.

The solution? Confine your dogs when strangers come in the house. Since I have both overly friendly and over protective dogs in my pack, I put them up in a bedroom or their crates when strangers come to visit. If it's workers, I let them do their jobs without interruption, if it's visitors, I find out if they want to

meet the dogs, and then let the dogs come out to greet them. Usually, after having been confined for a while, the dogs are much calmer when they come out to greet the company. Please be proactive and keep your dogs from making a nuisance out of themselves or scaring people that come to visit!
